#### Wildlife Fund Of Washington Offers \$100,000 For Avalon Marshland

Tomorrow (Saturday) the Boreugh of Avalon will offer 953 scres of marshland known as Block 84 on the Boreugh Tax Map for sale, under tight restrictions guaranteeing the property rema'n in it's natural state. The sale is a result of negotiations between the borough of Avalon and the World Wildlife Fund of Washington, D.C. Herbert Mills, Executive Director, represented

the World Wildlife Fund, who has offered the minimum price of \$100,000 to purchase the tract for the purpose of conservation. The restrictions on the sale include:

 A conservation casement near the granted to the State of New Jersey within 30 days.

No dredging, depositing of spoils, garbage, trash or other waste material be allowed;

No structure of any type will be permitted.

 Easement rights for regiona' water or sewer lines will be permitted, but no sewer plants will be allowed.

If any of the above restrictions are violated, the title to the land will revert back to the Borough.


