Saving our Salt Marsh

Have you ever driven in on Stone Harbor Boulevard and wondered about those pools of water



you're seeing mixed in with the marshes? After you watch this informative video, you'll know that that's not necessarily a good thing. This is not a unique problem in our area, but we are fortunate to have the world-renowned Wetlands Institute right over the bridge. In this interview, Susan Barrett, SHPOA Sustainability Committee Chair and Dr. Lenore Tedesco, Executive Director at the Wetlands Institute, go into detail about the test area we have seen in the marshes that shows promise for an

alternative process that helps with the use of potential dredge material, but also helps bring the marshes back from destruction.

This year's <u>fall Beach Sweep</u> was another great success. Nothing provides a better turnout than picture perfect fall weather and over 30 volunteers who worked the entire length of our



beaches and dunes. As in the past, most of the debris collected was in the dunes, particularly near beach block residential construction. Plastic and construction debris continue to be the primary materials collected. Small plastic from many origins was noted all along the high tide water's edge, and unfortunately, this situation was prevalent throughout the summer and notably worse than in previous years. Several items too large to be removed by our

volunteers were reported to DPW.

The assessment indicates there was minimal damage to the dunes, and the beach access road at the Point appears to be undamaged. More detailed assessments will be conducted as the winter season progresses.

Did you lose precious plantings during Hurricane Erin this fall? Many of us did, largely because of the salty flood waters that rose and lingered in the streets during the storm. If this





Historical Stone Harbor - Courtesy of Stone Harbor Museum

BACK IN TIME - From the very beginning of the Stone Harbor community, fire was a widespread fear. The wooden homes and strong winds of the island proved a dangerous combination; one spark is all that would have been needed to set an entire block ablaze, and with the frequency of marsh and brush fires, one spark wasn't hard to come by. In fact, it was common practice for families to keep a bucket of water on hand and, for the very careful, a bucket or two of beach sand." The aforementioned introductory statement is a quote that served as a lead-in to the chapter on the "Fire Department" contained in the 2014 edition of the book titled "STONE HARBOR: ONE HUNDRED YEARS OF THE SEASHORE AT ITS BEST".

Given the increasing number of homes and businesses being built in Stone Harbor from 1912 onward, there was a strong need for fire protection. In December 1912, the Stone Harbor Volunteer Fire Company Number 1 was created and organized, consisting of 20 men. These volunteers were hardy men who were local and were directly tied to the many early ongoing construction projects taking place at Stone Harbor. The men represented some of the various building trades and thereby were readily available to serve.

Land for the first fire station was donated by well-known Mrs. Reese Risley. In May of 1913, the official dedication occurred at the new fire station located at 85th Street and Second Avenue. This special occasion was much heralded and there were parades and much cause for celebration. The main speaker at this noteworthy dedicatory event was none other than Howard Risley, then president of the South Jersey Realty Company. R.C. Hill became the first fire chief and Harry Simpson was the first president of the Stone Harbor Fire Company.

Shown here stands a two-story wooden fire station with an upper deck or porch designed for observation and look-out and there was ample room to house a horse-drawn water pumper (then "state of the art" fire equipment) as shown above in front of the double-hung large wooden doors. In this classic photo image we can observe 7 men posed and standing proudly and holding various important pieces of fire equipment including a lantern, axe, fire extinguisher and even a nozzle attachment for a fire hose. It should be noted that in front of the fire station was a large circular piece of iron which when hit with a mallet served as a means of sounding the alarm for an emergency in the community. Research tells us that as of 1965 this very original building, while long since replaced by a more up-to-date and larger fire station at Second Avenue and 96th Street built in 1924, was still standing and had for a while been converted to a residential cottage.
